### IT324: Language III

Semester: 1

**Module Description**: This module will build on the grammar studied in second year in order to help students to improve their linguistic accuracy and writing skills in Italian. Through reading authentic Italian texts, and through discussing a wide range of topics, students will also increase their vocabulary and comprehension as well as acquire more sophisticated written communication skills. In semester 1, one hour a week will be dedicated to essay writing skills. The module includes 1 hour per week dedicated to audiovisual translation techniques, including subtitling and revoicing tasks.

#### IT346: Oral, Presentation & Transferable Skills

Semester: 1 & 2

Contact hours per week: 1

**ECTS**: 5

**Coordinator**: Dr. Andrea Ciribuco **Lecturers**: Dott.ssa Sveva Zafferri

**Module Description**: Over the course of this year long module students will engage in a variety of linguistic activities designed to improve their oral and presentation skills and enhance transferable skills (talking in public, job interviews, preparing CVs etc). Material provided in class will prompt conversation on different topics and students will be expected to use appropriate vocabulary and language structures. Continuous assessment will consist of 4 in class individual presentations of 5 minutes duration.

The Christmas and Summer oral examinations will consist of a 5-minute presentation followed by a few questions on the presentation and a few more general questions (15 minutes in total). The Summer oral examination will consist in a converastion on a range of topics linked to a list of current events and themes, provided boforehand by the lecturers (15 minutes)

### **IT342: Italian Culture & Society III: MODERN FICTION**

Semester: 1

Contact hours per semester: 24

**ECTS**: 5

Lecturer: Prof. Paolo Bartoloni

**Module Description**: This unit introduces students to some of the most significant prose of the twentieth Century, focusing on content, style and historical context. The selected texts will be analysed and discussed according to a set of theoretical frameworks, including modernism and postmodernism. Individual analysis will be integrated by a comparative approach which will highlight literary developments and transformation.

**Method of assessment and examination**: Final essay (70% - 3,000 words); one class assessment (25% - 750 words); attendance and participation (5%).

**Core text**: Course booklet to be provided by the lecturer.

#### IT343: Italian Culture & Society IV: LOVE & LITERATURE

Semester: 2

Contact hours per semester: 24

**ECTS**: 5

Lecturer: Prof. Paolo Bartoloni

**Module Description**: Love has always been one of literature's main themes, from the dolce stil novo of Dante and Cavalcanti to the contemporary stories of Calvino and Moravia. But how is it that love is represented through stories, poetry, and cinema? This module will discuss a series of selected texts, highlighting their unique traits while also comparing and contrasting modes of literary presentation, and the influences that historical and social changes have brought about.

Method of assessment and examination: Final essay (70% - 3,000 words); one class assessment

(25% - 750 words); attendance and participation (5%).

Language of instruction: Italian and English

**Core text**: Course booklet to be provided by the lecturer.

### **IT344: Italian Children's Literature**

Semester: 2

Contact hours per semester: 24

**ECTS**: 5

**Lecturer**: Dr. Lindsay Myers

**Module Description**: This module will critically examine the two most famous work of Italian children's fiction, *Le Avventure di Pinocchio* by Carlo Collodi and Edmondo De Amicis' *Cuore*. The novels will be examined from a variety of perspectives, as classics of children's literature, as historical documents, as a didactic manuals, as a literary masterpiece and as a sources of inspiration for later writers and directors. In addition to reading the text and a selection of critical material, students will also be asked to view a selection of film versions of Pthe novels and to discuss them.

Method of assessment and examination: Presentation (30%), Final Essay (70% - 3,000 words)

Language of instruction: Italian and English

Core texts: Carlo Collodi, Le Avventure di Pinocchio and Edmondo De Amics, Cuore.

### **Additional Information**

<u>Entry requirements</u>: A pass in Second Arts Italian or its equivalent in the case of Visiting and exchange students. Students registered for the BA (International) must also have attained satisfactory examination results during their year abroad.

Regular <u>attendance</u> is *mandatory* and a proportion of the final marks will be assigned for this requirement. Students might not be allowed to sit examinations, should their attendance be less than 70%

Students must obtain 40% in the <u>language requirements</u> (language: written and oral, semester tests, language laboratory, conversation and class attendance) in order to progress to the next year.

<u>Essays</u>: All essays for assessment must be placed in the Italian Department Essay Box located in AMB-2036 (located in the photocopying room on the top floor of the Arts Millennium Building), through Turn-It-In or other modalities advised by staff according to the deadlines assigned by the lecturers. **Essays submitted by email will NOT be accepted**.
