Nomination Requirements:

To be considered for acceptance to Fairfield University, students must be nominated by their home university. Nomination forms are sent to Nicole Moffa – nmoffa@fairfield.edu. The documentation required for nomination can be found below:

- 1. An excel document including the following information:
 - a. First name
 - b. Last Name
 - c. Email
 - d. D.O.B
 - e. Gender
 - f. Term(s) and year of intent at Fairfield
 - g. Student GPA
 - h. Student Major
 - i. Student Minor
 - j. Number of Semesters completed
 - k. List of courses student must take abroad
 - I. Does this student have academic flexibility?
 - m. What is this students current living environment? Do they live at home or at school?
 - n. Would the students be able to cook on their own?
 - o. Additional Notes
- 2. Language acquisition score (where applicable)
- 3. Students transcripts (if not in English, please be sure to send a translated version)
- 4. A list of the degree requirements for the student's degree completion. Feel free to send this as a PDF, word document, link, etc.
 - a. Some institutions call this a plan of study or courses and curriculum. For questions, please contact Nicole Moffa: Nmoffa@fairfield.edu.

Once the nominations are received, Nicole will provide the student with the instructions to open a Fairfield application to apply.

Admission and Requirements

Acceptance Decisions

Once students are nominated and complete their Fairfield University study abroad application, the complete applications are sent to academic departments for review. All final acceptance decisions are made by Fairfield University academic departments.

Language Aptitude Scores

- TOEFL Score: 80 (Internet-based) or a minimum score of 550 (paper-based) is required
- IELTS Score: A minimum score of a 6.5 is required

Upon Acceptance

Upon acceptance, students are provided with a welcome packet that provides them with a checklist of next steps they need to complete prior to arrival. To ensure a successful transition to Fairfield, it is imperative students abide by these deadlines. Included in the welcome packet will be information regarding housing, academic registration, student life and resources, airport pickup information and more.

About the Magis Core Curriculum

Fairfield University's liberal arts core curriculum gives students the knowledge and skills to better understand the world and their place in it. The Magis Core Curriculum is a discipline-based, tiered experience. The curriculum provides a common experience for all undergraduate students, grounded in the humanistic tradition, and is a hallmark of a Fairfield University education.

The Magis Curriculum has 22 curricular requirements five general areas of study:

- 1. Mathematics and Natural Science
 - a. Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Behavioral Neuroscience
- 2. History and the Social and Behavioral Sciences
 - a. Anthropology, Communication, Economics, Politics, Psychology and Sociology
- 3. Philosophy and Religious Studies
- 4. English and Visual and Performing Arts
 - a. Art History, Film, Television and Media Arts, Music, Studio Art, and Theatre
- 5. Modern and Classical languages

A breakdown of the University core curriculum can be found in Appendix 1.

Academic Expectations:

Students can expect to have small classroom sizes, an average of 20 students per class, with faculty who are willing and able to be available for students outside of classroom teaching hours for extra help, if needed.

Being that Fairfield University is a Liberal Arts institution, **students coming to Fairfield do not take only courses in their major; they take a combination of courses in their major and in the core**. For example, a Politics major may take 2-3 Politics related courses, with the rest of their courses possibly being one course in Religion, and one in History.

The ability to be flexible in the types of courses students can take while at Fairfield will be key to a successful exchange term. A full-time student at Fairfield must enroll in 5 courses (15 U.S. credits) during their exchange semester.

A sample schedule can be found in Appendix 2. You will see this student is taking courses from a variety of disciplines: Spanish, Math, Economics, English and Accounting.

Education Applicants

Students applying for the education program cannot enroll in any education major courses due to Connecticut state laws. Students are allowed to enroll in education minor courses.

Dolan School of Business Applicants

The Business School requires course descriptions for all business courses taken to date during the application process. These documents help the academic advisor determine the appropriate level business courses.

Course Selection as an Exchange Student

To browse the course offerings from previous semesters, please follow the steps below:

- Visit: www.fairfield.edu/registration
- Click browse classes
- Select a term from the dropdown menu
- Leave the search fields blank and click "search"

To find course descriptions, please click on the name of the course and click on course description on the left-hand side.

^{*}Courses for the Fall semester are released in mid-March.

^{*}Courses for the Spring semester are released in early-October.

Course Registration:

Students will be responsible for submitting a course selection worksheet at point of application. On this worksheet, students will select their first-choice courses and secondary courses based on what will be offered during their term at Fairfield. From there, the student will need to send the sheet the relevant Dean listed above for registration.

Students are required to submit at least ten (10) course choices, ranking in order from most desired, to least desired with backup courses. This registration form is shared with the respective Dean's Office (contact information found below) for registration.

Though, of course, Fairfield University will try their best to accommodate students' requests, they cannot guarantee the availability of their top choices. Providing as many alternative courses as possible helps them to ensure the creation of a full course schedule. There may be no time conflicts with students' first 5 courses. For assistance, we recommend students use the Scheduling Tool document found in Appendix 3.

Visa Documents

DS-2019

The Form DS-2019 allows for the J-1 visa to be obtained and is required for J-1 international students planning to study full-time at Fairfield University. The Form DS-2019 will be sent only after an international student has completed all necessary application procedures. All forms required to process the DS-2019 will be sent to the student directly from the Office of Student Engagement, please wait for their email with instructions on how to proceed.

Financial Documentation

Students must submit official copies of either a bank statement or bank letter certifying available funds. Minimum required financial support amounts will be sent to students after acceptance.

Bank documentation must be submitted on official bank letterhead and must come directly from the originating bank. These documents can be emailed to Jane Aquino. The bank letter/bank statement must be no more than six months old.

If the funds are coming from someone other than the student, that person will need to complete an Affidavit of Support along with providing a bank letter or bank statement on bank letterhead. The Affidavit of Support and the bank letter/bank statement must be no more than six months old.

Please note: The Affidavit of Support has a line for a notary public to sign. If the student does not have access to a notary public, please notify the Office of Student Engagement before proceeding.

Immunization Requirements

The State of Connecticut General Statutes Section HB 6423 and Fairfield University require each full-time or matriculating student to provide proof of immunity or screening against measles, mumps, rubella, varicella, meningitis and tuberculosis. Matriculating students are defined as those enrolled in a degree seeking program. This includes both undergraduate and graduate students.

The White House announced that COVID-19 vaccines will be required for international travelers coming into the United States, with an effective date of November 8, 2021. For purposes of entry into the United States, vaccines accepted will include FDA approved or authorized and WHO Emergency Use

Listing vaccines. Students are also required to show a negative Covid-19 Test no more than three days before your travel date. Please refer to the link from the CDC for more information.

Service for Justice Residential College (S4J): Living and Learning Community (Residence Hall)

The Service for Justice Residential College is rooted in social justice, service, and allowing students to explore their various identities. By intentionally examining social justice issues, students are pushed to think about how they are called to use their privileges to help those who are oppressed.

In S4J, students will:

- Attend one overnight retreat each semester. These are 24 hours off campus at the beginning of the semesters.
- Participate in the Mentoring Communities of the program. Each student is placed in a
 mentoring community of 6-8 students with an adult mentor (alumni, faculty, staff, friend of the
 University). These meet once a month for about 1.5 hours to look at the questions of the
 programs on a deeper level.
- Attend an Orientation at the beginning of the year and a Re-Orientation at the beginning of the second semester.

Housing Applications

Students will apply for housing in their application after they have been accepted to study at Fairfield.

Meal Plans

Students who select to live in the townhouses or apartments will have a kitchen but are able to pay for a meal plan out of pocket upon arrival, should they wish. Students who live in the Living and Learning Residence Halls do not have a kitchen and pay for the meal plan out of pocket.

Do students share accommodation with international and domestic students?

Yes, students will be placed with both domestic and international students.
